2.6 Innovative processes adopted by the institution in Teaching and Learning:

The IQAC of the college always strives to improve and increase the learning capacity of students by motivating the faculty to adopt innovative teaching-learning pedagogy essentially focusing on a combination of traditional and modern teaching approaches.

Training the trainers: The faculty is encouraged to take up refresher courses and MOOCS to keep abreast with the latest in theory and practice of learning

Supplementing the traditional methodology: The classroom lecture format is supplemented with a host of modern teaching-learning methods:

- Use of audio-visual aids like power point presentations, videos, infographics and other such mind mapping tools that not only help maintaining the attention span of students but also help in grasping the concept in a better way
- Classroom learning is enriched by introducing real world experiences through field trips (industry/ museum/ hospital etc.), interaction with experts and scholars etc. that enable students relate better to the topic/course
- Use of flipped classroom strategy for active engagement and participation of pupil as well as enabling the instructor to deal with mixed levels and student difficulties in a better way
- Organizing quizzes and debates through various specialized societies of the college to keep up the inquisitiveness
- Pre and post lab sessions with students of science streams to inculcate the importance of self - learning
- Regular assignments and tests for continuous evaluation
- Organizing group projects on real case studies to promote team work and leadership

ICT enabled classrooms and labs:

Well-equipped and ICT enabled classrooms and labs are an added feature of the college infrastructure that plays an important role in providing a conducive environment to stimulate a student's mind to think and learn better. The faculty and support staff are well versed with the use of ICT for developing computer aided teaching and learning material.

Collaborations with International Universities

The college aims to provide an international flavour to the undergraduate students by fostering collaborations with universities of international repute. The college has organized Asian Undergraduate Summit in collaboration with National University of Singapore. Such initiatives introduce the students to the global arena of education through workshops, field visits and sessions with eminent personalities from India and abroad. Such summits will become a regular feature in the forthcoming academic sessions.

3. Research, Consultancy and Extension

In the pursuit of academic excellence, College provides a conducive environment for the faculty and students to engage in research and other academic activities. Every department regularly organizes talks, seminars and symposia. Similarly, various societies of the College invite specialists of their field and people of eminence to share their knowledge with students and faculty members. HC believes in the sustainable growth of society and for this honing the scientific temperament of the future generation is important. With this spirit, Hindu College and Green Chemistry Network Centre, Department of Chemistry, University of Delhi jointly organized an International Conference on “*Advancing Green Chemistry: Building a Sustainable Tomorrow*” at University of Delhi. The main aim of this conference was to discuss deep environmental issues by creating an interdisciplinary platform and share new information, advances and outlook in Green Chemistry. This forum provided an opportunity of meeting the connoisseur of Green Chemistry field, Dr. David Constable (Science Director, ACS Green Chemistry Institute (ACS-GCI), USA). The inaugural lecture was delivered by Dr. David Constable discussing the challenges and opportunities in the field of green chemistry. This two-day international conference included oral talks and poster presentations on the following important thematic tracks like wastewater treatment, bioremediation, nanotechnology, organic synthesis and catalysis. HC strives for the overall development of students and constantly endeavours to provide the best of platforms for the same. In this context, the College initiated collaboration with the National University of Singapore (NUS) to conduct *the Asian Undergraduate Summit (AUS)* -. The theme of AUS- was Leadership In A Complex World: Taking On Diffused Responsibilities”, which took place in two legs - one was at Hindu itself, as it was one of the 5 Overseas Host Universities, where students of Hindu College and National University of Singapore (NUS) together participated and engaged in discussions on issues pertinent to India: Impact of Demonetization and Skill Education. The second leg of the Summit took place at NUS, Singapore where students from top Asian universities of more than 6 countries, including China, Thailand, Indonesia, South Korea etc. participated. Students from different countries were grouped, creating a distinct cultural setting, to find solutions to real-world problems through “*Design Thinking Methodology*”, which they presented to a panel of experts. The Summit gave all the students a new academic zeal and the opportunity to look beyond their understanding of the world. There are many scientific institutions in India of national and international repute, established by efforts of Government of India and exposure of undergraduate students to these institutions, acts as an important ingredient in motivating them for research. National Physical Laboratory (NPL) is one such institution playing important role development in the overall development of science and technology in the country. A visit to the National Physical Laboratory (NPL), New Delhi provided exposure to various research opportunities in different fields to the students. The College has signed a MoU with National Institute of Immunology (NII), GOI for the *Science Setu Programme*, under this initiative talks and panel discussions were organized for the benefit of both the student and teaching community. Students get hands-on experience in the research laboratories of different NII scientists. Equally instrumental in introducing interdisciplinary pedagogic and research questions to students are initiatives such as screening of ethnographic films, political documentaries and adaptations of historical narratives and literary texts in films. From scientific films, ethnographic films, feature films, books in film form (eg. Shakespeare Cinema Series), documentary films to film on the College itself, the College promotes screenings, discussion and

At Hindu College, learning is a way of life. It is meant to pique the curiosity and stimulate the intellect of students at every level. Whether that means interaction with the faculty on academics or on issues beyond it, pupils are supported and mentored in the best possible way to groom them into well rounded citizens.

The College administration has always been perceptive of the needs of the students and financial constraints that they may face and is therefore prompt in extending financial assistance to all the needy students. The College also confers a wide array of prizes/ scholarships/ free ships, to the undergraduate as well as post graduate students motivating them to achieve academic excellence. Efforts are made to promote inclusion of differently abled students with other students by arranging for specific facilities like special washrooms, ramps, computer laboratories, laptops installed with specific software, Braille books etc. Also there is a dedicated society 'Ankur' that takes care of the needs of these special students. Various committees like Discipline Resource Committee (DRC), ICC, Grievance and Anti-Ragging committees etc. have been constituted to address the different concerns of students. 6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

Curriculum Development: Several faculty members are contributing as members of their respective department's Undergraduate and Postgraduate Committee of Courses in the University and are involved in deliberations on the modalities of improving and updating the curriculum on regular basis. A number of faculty members in content-development boards and committees both within and outside Delhi University such as ILL, NCERT, CBSE. The experience from such activities helps in overall improvement in the quality of teaching.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Each Department prepares its workload in the beginning of the academic session and submits to the Academic affairs Committee for according its approval, prior to submission to Principal. The Time table committee prepares the master timetable for allocating time slots and space for the departments, particularly for the interdisciplinary courses. The teachers are assigned their papers according to their expertise and accordingly, they prepare themselves well before the session takes off. All information of time tables of semester wise courses, teachers and rooms are displayed on notice boards as well as website. Teachers follow the academic calendar and plan their progress of teaching- learning. The semester mode is quite rigid in terms of availability of classes, yet teachers enthusiastically make all efforts to give a good and complete learning experience by including diverse methods of teaching such as site/ field visits, projects, case studies, documentary screenings, etc.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

University conducts centralized examinations at the end of every semester. In addition, the students are evaluated through a scheme of continuous evaluation with parameters such as tests, assignments, projects and presentations which constitute the IA (internal assessment) component of evaluation of each paper. IA is scrutinized by a department moderation committee, the composition of which is well laid down in the guidelines of the university in this regard. The next stage of the vetting of IA is the College monitoring committee which carefully and exhaustively goes through the marks awarded to each and every student in every paper, subsequent to which the results are uploaded on the University portal.

The students are shown their marks, once the monitoring committee completes its scrutiny by displaying the same on notice boards and the website. This helps in addressing any grievance of the students.

6.3.4 Research and Development

The College encourages research and related activities of teachers. Several teachers in Physics, Chemistry, Botany and Zoology are engaged in projects. Some of them are supervisors for Ph.D.

The vision document of the college includes a dedicated research facility construction work for which has been initiated. Once ready, the infrastructure strength for research will increase manifold giving tremendous enhancement to research for teachers and students.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

The College is completely Wi-Fi-enabled. The administrative and accounts section have been made efficient through customized software packages for ERP. Adequate number of science laboratories with equipment and apparatus needed to conduct all practical exercises prescribed in the curriculum. An additional large laboratory has been provided in the new building for each of the science laboratory. Six air-conditioned computer laboratories with all facilities meet the requirements of students for blended learning. The College has a fully automated library with OPAC facility, having more than one lakh books, some of them very rare and not available elsewhere. Some of the Departments also have their own libraries which they maintain themselves. Special care is taken to provide assistance and services to students with special needs.

A number of common facilities like a seminar room, auditorium, art-exhibition space, etc. provide the much needed space for the artistic expressions of the students. There are rooms earmarked for units like the NCC, NSS, EOC, and others in the Seminar building of the College. A counsellor has been appointed for addressing the needs of the students and is allocated a separate room. The College has always offered boarding/lodging facilities for its outstation students. There is a Boys' Hostel with 117 comfortable rooms which houses more than 200 students in congenial surroundings and a Girls' hostel with 150+ students has come up recently.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

Non teaching staff is trained regularly to enhance its soft skills and make more meaningful contribution to the effective management of the institution. MS office workshops, and computer related training are arranged in-house and staff is also sent on such trainings outside the college. The College encourages the lab staff to attend workshops to make them better equipped for handling laboratory work and conducting routine practical classes. Departmental Promotion Committees sit at regular intervals, whenever there are vacancies at various levels of the administration and teaching staff.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

- The College strictly follows the norms and ordinances of the University regarding selection procedure of teachers. Selection committees as per UGC guidelines are entrusted with the task of selecting teachers.
- All positions are filled according to the workload requirement and as per the roster for reservations maintained in the College according to university rules.
- For short term teaching needs such as when certain faculty is on leave for short durations, Ad hoc appointments are made or guest faculty are called for as the need is perceived.
- For permanent positions and temporary positions of one year or greater duration all posts are advertised prominently in leading national dailies, College and the University website.
- Eligibility criteria for various posts are spelled out clearly in the advertisement..
- For permanent posts the selection committee is constituted by the Chairperson of the governing body or his nominee, the Principal, the head of the concerned department at the University, subject experts, the Teacher In-charge/ senior most teacher of the Department at the College, and SC/ST/OBC observer.
- For Ad hoc appointments the selection committee comprises of the Principal, the Teacher In-charge and a senior teacher of the concerned department and the SC/ST/OBC observer.
- All eligible candidates are called for interview without any discrimination.
- The College takes care to ensure that teachers so meticulously recruited are provided the best of work conditions.
- The faculty are encouraged to pursue research and participate in upgradation Programmes like orientation and refresher courses.
- The College management approves study leave for pursuit of Ph.D. All welfare schemes of the university are readily made available for the faculty.
- The College has on-campus housing provision for teachers. Faculty are encouraged to participate in conferences and seminars in India and abroad. Many of the teachers have contributed to academic journals, written books, organized conferences and workshops and participated in them, as a result of the encouraging approach of the College.
- The Principal interacts with teachers and there is bonhomie among colleagues which pervades intellectual and personal spaces

6.3.8 Industry Interaction/Collaboration

Established in 2000, Disha, the placement cell of Hindu College provides interaction with the industry. Reputed companies and corporate houses are invited to placements for the final year students of the College. The cell registers undergraduate students of the College every year to offer placements related information and services. However, registration with the cell does not stand in the way for a student to be considered for on-campus placements. Students are empowered as follows:

- Organizing seminars, skill enhancement workshops, talks and industry/company visits to improve the job readiness of students.
- Facilitating internship programs for the first and the second year students alongside fellowships.

Collaboration for internships with several organizations.

.Generous funding from Ultra International, Relaxo Footwear, Indian oil Corporation, NPL, among others for organizing conferences and seminars.

Industry funding for building and infrastructure development.

More than 50 companies are in contact with college for placements and internships.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

Admissions to the 18 UG courses and 14 PG courses at Hindu College are done based on the data provided by the University through its centralized application system. The data received is studied carefully to decide the cut off percentage for admission in various courses. The procedure is to keep cut-off high and lower it down in subsequent lists till all sanctioned seats are filled up. It sometimes happens that over admissions take place even when the percentages have been kept high. Admission is done purely on the basis of merit and in line with the policies of the government, in reference to reservation of seats for various categories.

Admissions under the sports category are also done to the extent of 5% of the sanctioned strength. For this, there is again a centralized method of drawing merit amongst the students excelling in the sport event , which is in turn prepared based out of their credentials and the trials.

- A unique e-learning intra net portal called ‘Hindu e-learning portal’ acronymed **HELP** has been started to provide e resources to learners. Study resources such as previous question papers, faculty lectures and study material have been uploaded on the portal. Students have been provided unique login access to the portal with e-mail ids.
- All curriculum related information is accessible to students in digital mode through the HinduConnect information system. Students can login to access their timetables, assignment grades, attendance through the portal.
- More classrooms are being ICT enabled so that audio-visual techniques can be used for teaching.
- Extensive use of multi media teaching tools, internet content from reliable sites, MOOCS, Swayam, ePathshala and other online portals for supplementing conventional curriculum delivery.
- Several teachers are engaged in creation of MOOCs content and giving video lectures to enhance the learning experience of students.
- The media lab envisaged in the New Research Centre shall have fully equipped recording studios for creation of video lectures and e classrooms.

All in all, the college is committed to a learner-centric educational paradigm and has elevated students’ access to e learning to an institutional best practice.

STRENGTHS

- Being one of the oldest mainstream colleges of higher education in the North Campus of Delhi University confers prestige and credibility to Hindu College across the nation and abroad.
- Founded in 1899, the College has always striven for academic excellence and service to the nation. Hindu College as an institution has faced, and has shaped, the changes in the field of education through colonial times and the freedom struggle, to the era of planned development, the globalized and the digitized times. In the recent years, the College has taken a number of initiatives in the social sector thus serving society at large.
- The College revels in the cultural diversity of its students and faculty who are drawn from across the Country. The heterogeneous character of the College community allows it to maintain, and sustain, a cosmopolitan outlook. Thus, while the College bears the name ‘Hindu’, its iconic annual cultural festival is called ‘Mecca’.
- Hindu College has been rated by reputed agencies among the top ten colleges in Sciences and the Social Science/Humanities streams. As a result, the College attracts the brightest students during admissions, the high cut-offs being a testimony of the same. The high percentage of marks is maintained and matched by the passing out percentage of students, and the progression rate from Under-graduation to Post-graduation, and by the rising number of on-campus placements of students.
- The College offers all the basic undergraduate and post-graduate subjects in the Sciences, Social Sciences/Humanities and Commerce streams. Interdisciplinary academic leveraging is, therefore, an on-campus reality. The faculty can take advantage of the diversity of subjects offered at the College to launch research initiatives that depend on interdisciplinary collaboration.
- The College has a dedicated and expert faculty with diverse research interests, actively involved in publishing and curriculum development. The faculty believes in strong work ethics and commitment to quality education.
- The credentials of the faculty show a remarkable collection of talent, with a large number of them having earned a Ph.D. from some of the finest institutions of higher learning. The College thus offers a fertile intellectual climate for its students. There is a strong bond and a high level of interaction between the faculty and the students. The faculty instils a broad foundation of knowledge and skills, equipping individual students to manage their lives in today’s complex times.

- Hindu College's location in the North Campus of Delhi University is a strategic advantage. Surrounded by other centres of academic excellence, (like the Delhi School of Economics, Faculty of Management Studies, St. Stephen's College, the Central libraries, the Post-Graduate departments), Hindu College competes with and also bench-marks the neighbourhood with academic excellence.
- Hindu College also has strategic locational advantage because it's a place where students can find internships, job opportunities, recreation, art centre and library, as well as a vibrant social life. Being an extremely welcoming and friendly place, in addition to academics, the campus life is buzzing throughout the year with cultural festivals, career fairs, trips and tours, picnics, debates, seminars etc. Such activities ensure that the student's experience is rich, varied and exciting. A pulsating extra-curricular and cultural life breeds on the campus in the form of more than 30 societies some of which have assumed iconic proportions in the extra-curricular life of Delhi University.
- The College has the unique distinction of having its own 'Parliament' which paves the way for democratic governance. The College acquired its Parliament way back in the 1920s -- decades before our country came to have one! The Hindu College Parliament continues to be an arena of democratic participation and resolution of issues through arguments and debates till date.
- The College is proud of its library collection. It is one of the earliest libraries in the University to have digitized its catalogue and bar code all its books. The College follows the practice of annual weeding out of books, done by the faculty of different departments.
- The College has moved to the forefront of the knowledge-based economy by incorporating technology in its pedagogical methodology. The entire college campus, including the hostel, is WiFi enabled and ICT facility is provided to the library and to the classrooms.
- The College installed several solar panels on its roof, way back in 2000, thereby leading the way to the harvesting of solar energy. The College hostel and the staff room draw a significant amount of its energy requirements from this environment friendly mechanism.
- The College's placement cell 'Disha' predates the establishment of the Central Placement Cell (CPC) of Delhi University. 'Disha' facilitates campus placements and internships for its undergraduate students in blue-chip companies, banks and other prestigious organizations.
- The huge 25 acres college campus has minimal spaces covered with concrete. Its sprawling green lawns are consistent with the best environmental practices and water harvesting mechanisms. They also serve as cultural hot-spots for student activities.
- The boys' hostel has been an integral part of the College from the very beginning. It is rooted in the history of India's freedom struggle as it provided refuge to revolutionaries like Chandrashekhar Azad. Over the decades it has contributed in

retaining some very bright outstation students. The hostel gives a sense of community to its dwellers who are part of a cultural group _Samvad‘ which organizes film shows, debates and post-dinner discussions.

- With the construction of a new girls‘ hostel fast becoming a reality, the College is likely to retain outstation girls who generally by-pass Hindu College during the admissions and opt for other colleges of matching repute.
- The science laboratories are an asset to the College. They are spacious and well equipped with modern technology and facilities.
- The College provides parking space for cars, motorbikes/scooters and cycles separately. The parking space is barricaded leaving the academic blocks untouched.

WEAKNESSES

- Our repertoire is constrained in terms of academic subject offerings. For example, the College offers almost the entire range of conventional subjects as _Honours‘ courses; however, the emerging fields and application-based courses like bio-technology, computer sciences, psychology and geography are not offered as _Honours‘ courses.
- The IT potential needs to be taken full advantage of. More overhead projectors need to be provided in the classrooms.
- The spacious science laboratories seem to have shrunk in space because of the increase in the number of students over the years.
- The College auditorium over the years is in need of repair and renovation.
- With a cluster of public institutions located in close proximity to the College, traffic jams are endemic and are a perpetual problem on the roads leading to the College.

OPPORTUNITIES

- The collaborative culture between the academia and student affairs can help us with both strategic planning and decision making to maintain high employee morale. The willingness to recognize weaknesses and make improvements can help us create an atmosphere of success for the faculty, staff and students.
- The new academic block has eased the physical infrastructural constraint in terms of bigger classrooms, departmental rooms, an expanded library and more conference rooms. The increased space can be utilized to introduce new skill based courses.
- The College acquired a state-of-the-art sports pavilion during the 2010 Commonwealth Games when it was a venue for the Rugby practice matches. With a

few modifications, this facility can be customized to the sports' requirements of our students and thus leverage the added facilities in the College.

- There has been expansion of science laboratories with the construction of the new academic block.
- New conference room facilities have been created for state of the art facilities
- A large number of office staff have been recruited through a massive direct recruitment exercise filling the much needed requirement of personnel.

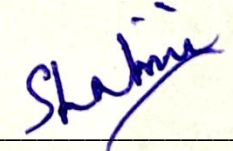
THREATS

- Over the last few years Hindu College has experienced extraordinary enrolment of students. There is a need to monitor our admission policy and supply and demand data to make intentional adjustments in undergraduate enrolments at the time of admissions.
- Inadequate work spaces pose certain difficulties.
- Another issue to address is the public and student image of education as only a means of obtaining a career.

8. Plans of institution for next year

- Building a dedicated research facility for the faculty and students, 'The Centre for Interdisciplinary Research', for sciences and social sciences, with a linguistics lab and media lab. The Centre will constitute an integrated research hub in the College upscaling opportunities for students. The four storeyed building covering 38000 sq. feet. area will house laboratories for sciences, social sciences, linguistics and a media laboratory.
- Fully equipping laboratories in the Sangneria Science Block, one each for Physics, Chemistry, Botany and Zoology.
- A unique scheme of Interdisciplinary Research Projects to be launched to promote the research environment in the college,. This shall give the undergraduate students an exposure of research that is happening across the globe. Through these projects, the students and the teachers together will be able to move beyond the boundaries of their own subject and help in solving the real world challenges.
- Each project shall have 2-3 teachers and 10 students from different disciplines. A grant of Rs 2.5 lakhs to be earmarked for the projects involving experimental sciences. For Projects involving Theoretical Sciences, Humanities & Social Sciences, a grant of Rs 1.5 Lakhs each to be fully funded by the college.
- Renovation of auditorium, with central air conditioning, revamp of seats, audio-visual equipment, acoustics enhancement, stage renovation and green room revamp, giving a complete overhaul to the auditorium. The College auditorium will soon be renovated completely.
