## **CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS**

#### 1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

As a College of University of Delhi, Hindu College has substantial presence by virtue of its premier status, and University takes into account the suggestions provided by the faculty while designing the curriculum for the students. A significant number of the College faculty is actively engaged in curriculum design and syllabus development at the University. Teachers also serve on various high-level committees of the university from time to time such as the Academic Council, Executive Council, Deanships of student welfare, Committees of Courses and Studies, and contribute to e-learning and distance education initiatives like UGC e-pathshala, ILLL and DU Massive Open Online Course The prescribed University curriculum, to which the College strictly adheres, is implemented through Staff Council-mandated committees such as the 'Academic Affairs and Research Committee'. This system of Committees ensures that the stated objectives of the curriculum are well achieved in the course of implementation. As articulated in the goals and objectives of the institution, we leave no stone unturned in order to develop over-all personality of the students. Besides imparting classroom teaching, the teachers encourage the students to develop their skills in various other fields. Seminars, lectures, symposiums, debates, etc., are conducted to supplement the curricular activities. The faculty members constantly update their knowledge by attending refresher courses, seminars, workshops, conferences and by consulting the reference books, journals, etc., in their subjects. The result in the University examination bears testimony to the sincere efforts put in by the teachers in the teaching, learning and evaluation process. While the College benefits from implementation support from the University, it also internally supports its teaching staff through open channels of communication, provision of leave for capacity-building initiatives, and financial assistance to attend academic events. It also provides infrastructural and technological support in the form of ICT-enabled classrooms, laboratories, library and research database access, Wi-Fi internet access, laptops, etc. Enabling and encouraging research and publication by students is an important means to operationalize the curriculum more effectively.

The infrastructural requirements of the college are routed through committees such as Maintenance and Development Committee and Building Committee. The financial obligations are worked out by the Principal in consultation with the Bursar and the accounts department of the college. Projects involving a large financial outlay are routed through the Governing Body. With increase in the number of students, the infrastructure for the science laboratories and the class rooms has been expanded. The four laboratories (one each for chemistry, physics, botany and zoology), with a capacity of 40 students each was furnished and was open for the students to use. 20 classrooms and 4 conference/seminar rooms were also put to commissioning. The laboratories are regularly upgraded with latest equipments / instruments. The reserve section of the library was renovated and in the meantime a portion of the new academic block was used as an extended library section. Boys' hostel being a structure of 1954 was also put under renovation. The girls' hostel is being well maintained by the outsourced staff. The college also decided to open up the tender for the retrofitting in the old college building. All the renovations were routed through the Building committee and were conducted under the supervision of an engineer and an architect. The mega project of the renovation of the 750 seater college auditorium, worth Rs 3.5 crore was also initiated. Displaying the gesture of benevolence this project was undertaken by one of our key philanthropist donors, Sh. Sant Sanganeria, CEO of Ultra International Ltd. Looking at the vast infrastructure which was continuously expanding, an estate

officer was appointed. The cleanliness of the classrooms, corridors, washrooms, etc. was ensured by regular staff of the college with the help of the outsourced staff. AMC is taken for air conditioners, laboratory equipments, RO, CCTV, Wi-Fi system, desktops and laptops.

With reflexive managerial practices, the college has grown organically over 120 years. The college believes in empowered sharing of responsibility and well represented participative management practices across all stakeholders. Hindu College Parliament is an iconic example of a collective of students that is democratic and is fully embedded with the ethos of systematic decentralisation and participative management. The College Parliament is a unique organisation in the country. All students and teachers of the college are its members. Students elect the Prime Minister from amongst themselves. There is also a leader of the opposition. The Speaker of the Parliament is a teacher. Principal is President of the Hindu College Republic. Parliament is also involved in allocating funds to students' societies in the college. Owing to substantial growth in students' society activities over the years, the parliament decentralised participative management of respective societies to the elected students members and their staff advisors. In 2019-2020, a societies' charter was finalised: Events' calendar for each academic year and minimum code of conduct was sought from the students run societies and on their agreement of a common minimum basic charter they were allocated resources, spaces, permissions, and agency within the college. The prestigious Asian Undergraduate Summit 2019 was held under the theme Leadership in a Complex World: Harnessing Untapped Potential. The focus theme for the Hindu leg was Cultural and Environmental Resources. This year also included Thailand as overseas leg, apart from at the National University of Singapore. In Thailand, the participants were addressed by Dr. Vipan Prjuabmoh, Professor, Chulalongkorn University, on the issue of the ageing population in Thailand. The summit was held between 30th June to 6th July 2019. The Hindu leg hosted delegates from Indonesia, Singapore, South Korea, and Thailand. The summit was declared open by His Excellency Chutintorn Gongsakdi, the Royal Thai Ambassador to India. The keynote address was delivered by Padma Vibhushan recipient Dr. Sonal Mansingh. In all, the summit renewed the academic zeal of students and gave opportunity to share and experience different cultures and look beyond their own understanding of the world. Along with this, in order to implement

decentralisation and participative management in true spirit, continuously review their practises, appraise the college community about the year's proceedings and elect and induct successive new members. In 2019-2020 for the betterment of students of Hindu College in terms of capacity building, leadership skills, personal development, and to facilitate to them opportunities to participate in nation-building projects, the Hindu CII-Yi Yuva Chapter was established. Admission of Students	Details The admission process at Hindu college is an important event in an academic year. Admissions to Hindu College are done in a completely transparent manner strictly according to the university rules. Although the admissions are based on the data provided by the University of Delhi Centralized Pre-Admission process, each department scrutinizes this data to determine the cut-off. To avoid over- admission, the college begins with a high cut-off and then lowers it cautiously. Hindu College cut-offs are consistently amongst the highest in the University of Delhi colleges across different disciplines. Hindu College has upgraded its administrative infrastructure to successfully execute the admissions with high bandwidth access to the university admissions portals. The admission grievance committee attends to any grievances and difficulties that students may face. The admission committee headed by a convenor and with faculty members from different departments oversees the admission process. There is a Nodal Officer for Admissions who communicates with the university throughout the process of admissions. Awareness about cleanliness and the need for reducing plastic use was spread in Jindpur village. Sessions were also conducted in the college, including lecture and

debate. NSS in collaboration with "RAWS" NGO and "Connect for" NGO, organised Tree Plantation Drive on 14-9-2019. NSS organised a rally under "Swachhta Abhiyan -SAY NO TO PLASTIC" at Dheerpur village. Volunteers from the environment wing came together for this in great numbers. Pledge and Cleanliness drive was undertaken under 'Swacchta hi Seva hai'. Paper collection boxes were established in college premises and paper collection drive conducted during student elections. Street play was performed on plastic pollution. The college also organised a workshop in collaboration with Chintan on Single Use Plastic. All the plastic waste was collected and disposed in the college bins. Under the Swachhta Abhiyan 2020, a Swachhta pledge was taken by college community in the college campus. In June-July 2019, an Online Campaign was started to make people aware of the endangered wildlife species of India under the aegis of 'Animal of the month'. In August 2019 Earthlings society organised a talk by Bikram Grewal on Wildlife in India. A visit to Asola Bhatti Wildlife Sanctuary was done to celebrate 'Butterfly Week'. In November 2019, Wildlife Week was celebrated with an online campaign for wildlife. CEO of Wildlife Trust of India, delivered lecture on 'Conservation- the Art of the Possible', followed by the panel discussion with a diverse eminent panel. A national seminar was organised on 'Role of Women and Media in Water Conservation' in collaboration with Indian Association of Mass Communication. We also participated in the large-scale plantation drive organized by Times of India in association with DDA and CEMDE, University of Delhi, in Kamala Nehru Biodiversity Park. Hindu Earth Summit was organised on the theme 'Combating Climatic Change'. Enactus successfully collaborated with Delhi Police, FMA, TATA Trusts and LED Safari and currently has four ongoing projects. Project Oorja seeks to tackle the problem of expensive lighting for street vendors with a unique Solar LED Oorja lamp specifically designed to cater to these vendors problems. Project Soaprise involves collecting used and discarded soaps from hotels in Delhi NCR, making a proper soap base after the cleaning process and send it to a village called Karkar in Ghaziabad where women make various soaps using the melt and pour process. Project Antraat contributes towards waste management in collaboration with Vision of India and Hunar Foundation. Project Jal in its pilot phase provides bio-sand filters, JalKalp to village Abheypur.

Objectives of the Practice Hindu College has attempted to reaffirm its commitment towards student progression and industry articulation by taking significant strides in industry collaboration and entrepreneurship development as an institutional Best Practice. This collaboration has been enhanced through Business Planning, Strategic Marketing, Social Development 3. The Context The Hindu College CII-Young Indians Yuva Chapter, Hindu Innovation Council, Entrepreneurship Cell and Hindu Consulting

Group have been strengthened with active engagement of faculty and special attentiveness from IQAC. The Hindu Consulting Group has an active presence on three social media handles - Facebook, Instagram and LinkedIn. We are in the top in the university terms of followers on LinkedIn. We hope to optimize our reach for acquiring clients and organizing sessions. 4. The Practice As part of collaborating with Industry for Skill Development and Entrepreneurship Hindu College undertook projects centered around Business Planning, Strategic Marketing and Social Development. Under Business Planning we took 3 projects: • HaldiVita: Haldivita is a FMCG Nutraceutical start-up incubated by IIM Kashipur. We worked with Mr. Sameer Gupta who is the co-founder, in Financial Analysis, Market Research, Sales, Marketing and Compliance profiles. • EiCash: EiCash is one of the largest growing start-ups in the field of Anti-Counterfeiting technology and block-chain where we worked on formulating marketresearch reports, business plans, marketing strategies and data-analysis • Widhya: Widhya is a Tech Educational Startup aimed at bridging the gap between industries and the students by providing them exposure to live projects. We were responsible for conducting competitor analysis, price analysis, through market research and devising and recommending new business strategies and revenue ideas for increasing its reach and customer base along with designing a detailed and consolidated pitch deck for the client. Under Strategic Marketing, we acquired the following projects: • Kineer: Kineer is a water-packaging startup doing tremendous work in employing transgenders and providing a livelihood.It is incubated by IIM Ahmedabad where we managed the social media by putting out researched articles and infographics for the community of Kineer. • Bahri Papers: Bahri Paper Industries are manufacturers based in New Delhi, who have collaborated with US, UK and European companies in setting up production lines for them. We drafted a pitch deck, strategizing perfect market plans for their entry in the Indian market specifically, via Amazon. • El-Diablo Sauces: El diablo is a unique sauce startup that has established its presence PAN india via online marketplace and is also increasing its reach to overseas borders. HCG was involved in finding new avenues for expansion, ideating marketing strategies, identifying market trends, optimising marketing initiatives and consolidating information into actionable items and presentations. Under Social Development, we acquired the following projects: • Zomato Feeding India: Magic Wheels vans are custom designed 24/7 running vehicles that follow a standard operating process to maintain food safety regulations before collecting the food and also at the time of serving meals to the beneficiaries. We created clusters in Delhi, Lucknow, Mumbai, and Bangalore and Chennai consisting of food-procurement locations, storage and hunger points especially capitalising on the wedding plans. • Katha: Katha is a registered non profit and non-governmental organization based in Delhi that works in the field of community development, children welfare, education and literature establishing 96 schools in Delhi and giving 7000 under privileged children access to education. We were responsible for making a name for Katha in the DU Circuit by establishing book-reading sessions, book stalls, seminars, critic reviews and forming collaborations with the literary and drama societies. • Navjyoti India Foundation: Navjyoti India Foundation is a not- for-profit society registered by 16 police officers of Delhi Police and conceived by Dr. Kiran Bedi and her team of North district police with the aim of crime prevention through welfare policing. We structured a baseline assessment by surveying the Navjyoti students, staff and the community around by preparing a questionnaire and analysing it to provide the foundation a guide for the effective delivery of future initiatives. • Teach For India: Teach For India (TFI) is a non-profit organisation that is a part of the Teach For All network, striving to end educational inequality in India by appointing fellows as fulltime teachers in under-resourced schools. We worked with the Recruitment Team where we helped TFI determine its engagement on the campus and ideated engagement strategies to scale up their fellowship recruitments. 5. Evidence of

Success • An outcome of enhanced Industry Collaboration for Skill Development and Entrepreneurship has been the improved placement figures in the current academic session (up to January 2019) that reveal an increase in the Gross Package Value by a good 8.27. While the figure was Rs. 2.9 crores last year, this year it stood at Rs. 3.2 crores. The total number of job offers to the undergraduate students of the college too clocked an increase to 54 from 48 last year. • The highest package offered to the students stood at Rs. 31 lakhs per annum while the average package came out to be approximately Rs. 6 lakhs per annum. These figures count amongst the best that any Delhi University college could bag in the ongoing session. • LEK Consulting, Nomura, Tres Vista figured as some of the new recruiters on the college campus, Bain Capability Centre, Boston Consulting Group, ZS Associates, Deloitte, American International Group, Accenture, Dell, Zomato and many more companies have continued to come to Hindu College year after year and have incessantly found a student base that is rich in talent and creativity. 1. Objectives of the Practice Counselling and providing emotional support to students is extremely important especially since we have many students who live away from their homes. At Hindu College, we place the highest degree of importance on mental and psychological health. We are committed to the task of helping every student in maintaining and improving their emotional well-being. With the ever growing stress of academic and competitive performance, it is crucial for Educational Institutions to look after the mental-emotional health of its students as well as staff. 3. The Context The beginning of 2020 was marked by the pandemic of coronavirus and subsequent lockdowns that have adversely affected the lives of almost everyone. Hindu College through its Counselling Cell has undertaken the mission of reaching out to its students located across the country by connecting with them and by ensuring the psycho-social support to them during covid-19 times. 4. The Practice • The college has a Counselling Cell headed by a qualified counsellor. When the Pandemic outbreak happened, counselling was scaled up massively and the cell was expanded and online counselling sessions were held individually and in groups to help students in the crisis. • Hindu College Counselling Centre (HCCC) continued its work to match its principle of 'Happy Mind. Happy Life . • The College counsellor was available for online counselling sessions via video- conferencing such as Skype, Google Meet platforms and connected with students on individual basis. Group sessions were also conducted for each department from the month of May, 2020. • Hindu College, further, came on board of "MANODARPAN-A PSYCHOSOCIAL SUPPORT" an initiative by MHRD Government of India, providing tele-counselling to the children, parents, teachers from across the country. College Counsellor is, also, on the panel of counsellors of National Council of Educational Research Training (NCERT), volunteering their counselling services, across the nation • "HINDU COLLEGE PEER COUNSELLOR'S GROUP" has been constituted with some college students on board trained to act as peer facilitators • Manodrishti, the journal of the Counselling Cell launched to provide an additional forum of expression • Social Media: We took up creative initiatives to reach our college community on social media to promote mental health awareness. These include Humans of Hindu where we share the stories of students, teachers, and workers in Hindu College on Instagram (1.6k followers) and Facebook. During the pandemic we commenced series #HoHathome featuring the connotations around mental health, pandemic and the loss of college life. It has set up a brand new research centre called Relaxo Research Centre. It is also in the process of building a three storey digital library. The college has also made rapid infrastructural advances by building new auditorium, a new science block and a new amphitheatre with the help of public-private partnership. Finally it can be concluded that Hindu College is rapidly embracing the new age infrastructural and e-resource requirements to ensure that its students and faculty members continue having access to world class facilities and that it is completely prepared and committed to take on the challenges of the present and the future.

#### 8. Future Plans of Actions for Next Academic Year

1. To strengthen the research infrastructure, capabilities and overall research environment of the college. This year 16 interdisciplinary innovation projects were launched, entirely funded by the college. Each project has a team of faculty members (PIs) and at least 10 undergraduate students. These projects are providing a unique opportunity to undergraduate students to participate in regular and serious scientific research. We plan to expand our research activity further through more projects and collaborations with industry and academia. 2. To create state-of-the-art research infrastructure During the pandemic induced lockdowns, the building construction work of the Centre for Interdisciplinary Research has progressed rapidly. It is now planned to furnish it with laboratory equipment, as well as for the media lab with recording studio and the linguistic lab. Having the necessary infrastructure will give further impetus to research and higher forms of learning. 3. To institute more add-on certificate courses for skill enhancement of students and community This year the college conducted 12 add-on certificate courses in the online mode. We plan to consolidate and expand upon this in the next year as well to provide students with applied knowledge and improve their prospects of employment. 4. To introduce hybrid modes of teaching in regular curriculum delivery The college started online teaching from March 2020 through the deployment of Learning Management System. We plan to expand this further as a supplement to regular classroom teaching in the future. 5. To conduct the planned external audits (Academic, Administrative) that had to be deferred due to the COVID situation, if conditions are favourable.
